Louisiana Red Cross seeks mental health professionals to serve as volunteers

When a major disaster or emergency occurs, the American Red Cross knows that the people affected not only need food and shelter, but also emotional support. They are anxious; they may be stressed or worried at their current situation and what they face in the days and weeks ahead.

When the Red Cross responds, part of the relief effort includes providing mental health services. Licensed mental health specialists deploy to assist victims with the new reality they are facing, and offer support to Red Cross staff (volunteers and employees).

Disasters during 2016, including the March and August floods, touched 92 percent of Louisiana parishes. Our neighbors and family know too well the personal effects of such disasters. In addition to the more than 83,000 overnight stays at shelters and nearly 1.6 million snacks and meals served to Louisiana residents during the large disasters of 2016, Red Cross volunteers also provided more than 57,000 health and mental health contacts.

And it's through everyday support, for example after home fires and for support of military families, and response during large-scale disasters that licensed mental health professionals like you are needed to serve in our community.

Mental health professionals serve in a wide variety of roles within the Red Cross. They serve in management and supervisory positions, as employees and volunteers, as providers of direct care services to those affected by disasters, as teachers and as representatives of the Red Cross with local and national community partners.

Among the key volunteer opportunities:

Client Casework (CC) volunteers evaluate needs, provides services and maintains records for clients. Volunteers provides direct assistance to individuals affected by man-made or natural disasters, ranging from single family home incidents to larger events such as tornadoes, floods, hurricanes, and catastrophic incidents. Assistance can be issued in two forms: hard assistance and soft assistance. Examples of soft assistance include listening, providing information, advocacy, counseling and referral. Hard assistance includes mass sheltering, feeding and the bulk distribution of personal care items and cleaning materials, as well as emergency financial assistance to all clients in order for them to be able to purchase items that are needed immediately in order to begin their recovery.

Disaster Mental Health (DMH) volunteers provide crisis interventions, mental health screening and assessment, emotional care and support, referrals, advocacy, mediation, consultation, psychosocial education and mobilization and psychological triage. On critical incidents spiritual care and child care will provide services as a component of disaster mental health. Must be licensed.

Through these roles and others, such volunteers:

- Respond to Disaster Action Team calls;
- Provide emotional support to families concerning disaster-related death or injury;
- Teach courses such as Disaster Mental Health Fundamentals, Psychological First Aid or Coping with Deployment;
- Maintain a list of local mental health resources for referrals and large-scale operations;
- Groom volunteers for leadership positions in Disaster Mental Health;
- Provide Disaster Mental Health coverage at disaster shelters, service centers and outreach teams;
- Provide emotional support to military families through Services to Armed Forces (e.g. accident, serious illness, death or other emergency);
- Attend Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) meetings, participating on Disaster Mental Health committees.

Red Cross Disaster Mental Health workers are not required to obtain their own professional liability insurance coverage to participate in Red Cross activities. When Disaster Mental Health workers are engaged in assigned disaster relief activities (i.e., performing their official duties as agents of the Red Cross), they are covered by the Red Cross corporate insurance program for their liability when the following conditions are met:

- The Disaster Mental Health worker engaged in the activity while under the control and supervision of an authorized Red Cross employee or volunteer.
- The Disaster Mental Health worker adhered to Red Cross and Disaster Mental Health policy and procedures when engaged in the activity.
- The Disaster Mental Health worker did not act in an illegal, unethical, or grossly negligent manner.

By volunteering with your local Red Cross chapter, you will make an important contribution to the millions of people in our state who rely on the Red Cross. You can make a difference.

NASW Statement on North Carolina *Piro v McKeever* Case

North Carolina social workers get positive outcome in *Piro v. McKeever*

Case centered upon statutory immunity for social workers who must report suspected child abuse

WASHINGTON, D.C. – A recent court decision issued by the North Carolina Supreme Court is a positive outcome for social workers in North Carolina.

In *Piro v. McKeever*, Ms. McKeever, LCSW, fulfilled her duty to report suspected child abuse when she reported sexual abuse allegations to authorities against her client’s father. The allegations were not substantiated by the Department of Social Services (DSS), and the father sued Ms. McKeever.

He alleged that Ms. McKeever improperly conducted therapy sessions with his son, which resulted in a Child Protective Service (CPS) child abuse report being made against him and deprived him of contact with his children.

Mr. Piro filed a complaint for negligent infliction of emotional distress; intentional infliction of emotional distress; and requesting punitive damages.

The trial court dismissed the complaint because it determined that the social worker’s alleged conduct was not ‘extreme and outrageous’ and the harm caused was not foreseeable. The Court of Appeals affirmed the trial court’s dismissal of the case and the father filed for review with the North Carolina Supreme Court.

In its review, the North Carolina Supreme Court was evenly split in its decision, which automatically resulted in the prior decisions being affirmed and the appellate court dismissing the case against Ms. McKeever.

Ms. McKeever was insured through NASW Assurance Services, Inc., and its panel attorney Jake Epstein provided her defense. She was further supported by the NASW Legal Defense Fund (LDF) with an amicus brief prepared and filed on her behalf by the North Carolina Chapter of NASW and the National NASW office.

Kathy Boyd, Executive Director of the North Carolina Chapter of NASW, stated that she “greatly appreciated the support and assistance of the NASW Legal Defense Fund in the preparation of a friend of the court brief. The issue of social worker immunity from liability to third parties for statutorily required child abuse reports is extremely important to social workers in North Carolina and throughout the country.”

Both the Legal Defense Fund and the North Carolina Chapter expressed their gratitude for the pro bono legal work provided by the McGuire Woods law firm in drafting the NASW amicus brief.

The amicus brief filed in this case is an example of the advocacy and support offered through the NASW Legal Defense Fund on legal issues of importance to the social work profession.

In the amicus brief, NASW discussed the importance of protecting the child abuse reporting process; the need for immunity for mandated reporters and why it is statutorily recognized; and the reasons that no duty is owed to third parties, such as the father in this case.

It was NASW’s position that because the father was never treated by Ms. McKeever, the social worker owed no legal duty to him. Imposing third party liability on social workers who are mandated reporters of suspected child abuse would jeopardize effective treatment and have serious and detrimental consequences in preventing child maltreatment.

This case serves as a reminder that social workers need to comply with the child abuse reporting requirements in their jurisdiction, keep adequate documentation of the information relating to the CPS report; and maintain adequate professional liability insurance.

Although this case can be considered a victory, this issue is not fully resolved, because a tie decision is not a precedent for future cases. Since the North Carolina Supreme Court was equally divided, this ruling can be challenged in the future. Advocacy efforts on both a local and state level must continue in order to achieve, preserve, and advance the gains that have been made thus far.

JUNE DEADLINE FOR CEUs is Fasting Approaching

Registered Social Workers, Graduate Social Workers, and Licensed Clinical Social Workers are required by law to collect at least twenty (20) hours of continuing education in approved programs each year with three (3) hours of ethics every two years. For the LCSW, ten (10) of the twenty (20) hours must be of clinical content including diagnosis and treatment. The current collection period is July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017. Beginning July 1, 2008, first time Board Approved Clinical Supervisors (BACS) must complete six and one half (6.5) hours of LABSWE approved clinical supervision education. All other Board Approved Clinical Supervisors (BACS) must complete three (3) hours of continuing education in clinical supervision every two years. 




